Pastor's Chris's Message

Last November I had to go to an event for First Call pastors in San Diego. The event included several speaking engagements to make sure we, as first call pastors, are continuing to grow in our ministries. One of the engagements included a professor speaking to us through a video conference call. After they were done speaking we were able to ask questions, but because of the nature of the device it was hard for the professor to hear us, so the synod employee next to the computer kept repeating every person's question to the professor.

This happened with probably 4 or 5 different folks sequentially, until we got to one of my friends from seminary, who is Latino. When he asked his question the first time the professor couldn't hear it, but rather than the employee repeating the question as they had done with every person before, they just sat there silently. So my friend repeated his question louder. Again the professor couldn't hear and again the employee just sat there. After two more attempts of my friend trying to convey his question fully and the professor guessing at what he was saying, he finally gave up and we all moved on.

Later on in a breakout group that was already planned about racism, we were talking about moments when racism is present and we might not be aware of it. My friend spoke up and asked if anyone noticed that every white person who asked a question of the professor had their question repeated verbatim, but when he asked a question he had to repeat himself 4 or 5 times before he finally gave up. We sat there in silence for a moment as we reflected on this recent experience. A few of the other folks of color said they noticed and a few of the white folks in the group, including myself, said nothing.

I had noticed. I noticed it when it was happening, but I'm so uncomfortable with conflict that I didn't say anything. I was also at a loss as to what I could have done, so I decided to be honest with the group. I told them I did notice it and I'm sorry I didn't help, but please let me learn from this and tell me what I could've done. "Call it out," said one person point blank. Just call it out. Not speaking up is a privilege I'm afforded because most issues of identity are not directed at me. People of color don't have this privilege. They have to speak up for themselves because they've grown accustomed to a world where no one else will. But I can use my platform as a white pastor to call it out. In fact, I have a lot of power in that platform to create change and to not do so would be wrong.

"Check in," was the other response. It was asked who checked in with my friend after the experience. A few of our colleagues of color checked in with him because they had been through this experience before. I did not. I haven't had my voice stifled since I was a kid and I don't remember what that feels like, but people of color know this experience all too well. Even if I hadn't spoken up, just checking in becomes an incredibly powerful way to show acknowledgment and partnership.

I share this story because we are entering Black History Month and this usually becomes a time where we share quotes and contributions from people of color, but rarely do we try to understand

what their experiences have been and continue to be like. Racism is something we, as white people, have thought of as explicit aggression towards different ethnic groups and we fail to ignore how racism has been deeply integrated into the very systems of society. We can say to ourselves that we aren't racist and so we don't need to address racism in our lives, but then we can become like me in that story, sitting there while someone's voice is being stifled.

As we enter into Black History Month I'm feeling called to pull away from being an institution that simply gives a shout out to the contributions people of color make to our society and moving further into understanding how systemic racism works in our lives and how we can be better allies for people and communities of color. If you find yourself questioning whether there is a need to address systemic racism in our own community, I'll remind you that only two years ago a Latina girl was bullied so badly with racist tropes that she physically lashed back at the aggressor and instead of folks asking why this happened the girl was simply expelled and treated like a deviant. I'd also like to remind us that only a few weeks ago a swastika was graffitied on a wall at the high school and it wasn't until the high school was pressured that they finally acknowledged it.

Finally, I want to remind us all that God came to this world in a particular time, place, and person through Jesus. He was a brown-skinned Palestinian Jewish man living under violent oppression from Rome, targeted because of where he was born, and most of the people he reached out to were the folks who were most affected by that oppression. Looking at how systemic racism is present in our community, how we might benefit from it, how we might be harmed by it, and how we can work towards eradicating it is not just the right thing to do, it's what we're called to do – it's divine work.

That's why I'd like to start offering spaces where we can come together and reflect, learn, grow, and respond. Please make sure you keep an eye out for these gathering spaces and please try to make it a point to be present. If this makes you feel uncomfortable, and I imagine it does, I'm going to ask that you try to be intentional about moving past that discomfort and do the work of the church. These aren't spaces where we'll be bashing ourselves and being called racist, but rather to look at the systems of racism that exists all around us in plain sight that we often don't see. If you feel like that does not exist, then I especially recommend you participate and if you have any questions or concerns, please come talk to me.

An International Helping Hand – Piyali Scholarships

During January and February, BLCW is sponsoring fundraising for the 2020 Piyali Learning Center scholarships. Again this year, our goal is to raise \$1,275. If you have already contributed, thank you and watch for the giving graphic on the Parish Hall bulletin board. Also, please visit this bulletin board to see photos of our recipients and their letters. Our elementary school students begin writing immediately in English and you will see how fluent Rekha is after 7+ years in the School. The young women's letters in Marathi (a major language in the Mumbai region) are translated into English by teachers at the school. One of the Marathi language letters is posted. We encourage parents of school age youngsters to share this display with them.

1. Elementary School Scholarships:

- *Rekha's scholarship (\$375, 13 years old and in 6th grade)
- *Bidisha scholarship (\$375, 6 years old and in her first year.)

2. Literacy/Vocational Training Program Scholarships (18 month-2 years, young women)

- *Kalidar's scholarship (\$175, married as child, 2 children, no opportunity for education, 2nd year, literacy)
- *Soma's scholarship (\$175), married, in 1st year year, learning tailoring
- *Lakshmi's scholarship (\$175), married, 2 children, daughter in Piyali School, 1st year, when school age was not able to continue studies due to parent illness.)

How can I invest in the education of these girls and young women? Your donation of any amount will enable their continued education.

40 Days/40 Items Challenge

Lent is coming! Lent is one of the most important times of the year for many Christians around the world, particularly those within the Anglican, Catholic and Orthodox traditions. Different people observe Lent in different ways; most people do this by giving something up for Lent.

Whether you're intending to give up chocolate, fast food, alcohol, or the Internet, we want to encourage you to do something generous during Lent, too. Instead of just giving up meat on Fridays for 40 days and indulging in fish fries, or--heaven forbid--foregoing chocolate, consider this Lenten discipline: Take the 40 days, 40 items challenge: Donate 40 items, collected during Lent.

What if Lent could be a time of radical generosity as well as spiritual discipline? What if each one of us donated 40 items to help others? Each day of the 40 days of Lent designate an item for giving and place it in a bag. Here are some suggestions:

40 canned/dried food donations for hungry families

40 brown bag breakfast items (protein drinks, juice, granola bars, applesauce, fruit cups)

40 dimes, quarters or dollars (you choose the denomination you would like to give)

40 toiletry items for those in need (shampoo, soap, lotion, razors) or 40 pairs of socks

40 items for our troops overseas (jerky, wet wipes, chapstick, coffee, batteries, boot socks)

40 pieces of clothing, books, towels, dishes, you would like to donate

40 of _____ (your idea here)

As you place each item daily, say a prayer or a Bible verse. Here are some suggestions but of course you can come up with your own:

Heavenly Father,

Thank you that you are a generous God and that you give us so many good things. We are sorry that we are not always generous with others. Please help us to be kind, to do our very best, and to be generous when we are helping others. Amen.

Dear God,

Thank You that You provide for all our needs. Thank You that we can trust You to turn the small things we give You into something big that can make a huge difference. Help us to be generous with everything we have, just as You are so generous in giving us these things. Amen.

On Easter Sunday, bring your donation items to worship where they will be received and blessed before being distributed.

Take the 40 Days, 40 Items Challenge. Maybe also challenge those you know to do it too. It's like giving up some of your abundance to others for Lent. By Easter Sunday, you will have had 40 days of discipline with a happy result, and shared your abundance with those who need help.


Events and Special Occasions

Council Meeting Report

The January 2020 monthly Council meeting was held at 7 pm on Jan. 16, 2020. Members present were Emily Abello, Wendy Bevier, Josh Bratt, Pastor Chris, Stewart Fries, Lynne Hemming, Carolyn Schuit, and Anne Twigg. Carol Lake, Lori McConnell and Jeanelle Needham were not present.

Council members reviewed, discussed, and approved for submission to the Congregation a proposed long-range plan as submitted by the Long-Range Planning Committee. Also discussed was a draft Congregational Gift Policy. These plans will be presented for approval at the Congregational Meeting Pt 2 on February 9, 2020.

Council members present also discussed a variety of administrative topics including:

- Congregational Meeting buffet to be hosted by Council
- 2020 labor law changes
- Approval for internal control reviews on church banking practices
- Election of new officers – outcome still pending

Treasurer's Report for December 2019

Balance Sheet:

- The cash balance in the operating fund at the end of the year was over \$19,000.
- All liabilities in December were paid and the church has no long-term indebtedness.
- The money market fund went down due to property improvements that were paid in December.
- The church's balance sheet remains strong with total assets of over \$3,700,000

Profit & Loss Budget Performance:

Income:

- Other income from the month was up by \$640, and up by approximately 40% for the year.
- Offerings for the month were up by \$7,434 (\$36,734 compared to \$29,300 budgeted) and were up by \$6,638 for the year.
- Other receipts for the year were up significantly due to the endowment fund contributions to extraordinary property expenses the church paid in 2019.
- Overall income for the year was up by \$35,467. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

Expenses:

- Benevolence was up for the year due to increased offerings and other designated benevolence contributions.
- Salaries & benefits were up by 3% over the budget
- Staff expenses were under budget for the year.
- Office administration expenses were over budget for the year.
- Property expenses were up by nearly \$7,000 due to numerous repairs to our facilities.
- Utilities were over budget for the year.
- All other expenses were at or near budget for the year.
- Overall we ended the year with a net revenue over expenses of nearly \$10,000.

Thanks to our members for their generous giving in December and to our non-member visitors we were able to balance our budget for the second year in a row! God has richly blessed Bethania and we respond to those blessings by continuing to expand our ministries in our community and the world.




