## Pastor Chris's Message

The first person to call God by name in the Bible is Hagar. Many of you might not remember who Hagar is, so here's a quick recap: We meet Abraham after we meet Adam and Eve and their children, and Noah, his wife and their children. Abraham is the man who God decides to bless with a great nation, which become the Jewish, Christian, and Muslim people. Before Abraham and Sarah have Isaac, Sarah is so concerned that she cannot conceive that she gives her slave, Hagar, to Abraham, who ends up conceiving a son with her. Sarah immediately regrets this decision and treats Hagar wickedly and Hagar runs away in fear and tears. As Hagar is crying, she is visited by an angel of God, who tells her that God sees her and the son she is carrying will become a great nation. It is in this moment that Hagar, an Egyptian slave, who is treated by Abraham and Sarah with such contempt, and who is seen and validated by God, utters God's name for the first time in the entire Bible. She says, I will call you El-roi, or *God who sees*.



Before the Jewish people become Israel, the next time God's name is brought up is when Jacob, a scumbag of a person, has stolen his brother's inheritance and fled from his brothers wrath, wrestles with an angel of God, and after beating the angel, asks for God's name. The angel refuses to give the name of God and instead renames Jacob, Israel, or *One who struggles with God*.

The next prestigious moment that centers on God's name is a bit more familiar, Moses and the burning bush. Moses has fled from Egypt and made a home for himself. He stumbles upon a burning bush, which contains God's voice and directs Moses to go back to Egypt to free the Hebrew people. Moses asks God, "Whom shall I say has sent me?" and God's response is simply, "I am what I am." You see God's name is incomprehensible, indefinable, uncontainable. And that's the point. God's name is not needed for Moses—the liberation of the Hebrews is needed. God's name is not needed for Jacob—Jacob's identity as Israel, the one who struggles with God, which becomes the identity of the Jewish people, is what's needed for Jacob. Again, the first person to even name God is a non-Jewish slave who is treated with contempt by the ancestors of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

God's name has always remained mysterious among Jewish and Muslim people. Most Jewish people will not speak God's name. Muslim people will not depict God in pictures or sculptures. This is not only because God is so magnanimous and inconceivable, but also because Jewish and Muslim people's identity is not wrapped in God's identity, it's wrapped in their relationships with their faith and the praxis of that relationship.

To Jesus' credit, Jesus attempts the same thing. After miracles, Jesus instructs people not to tell others who he is. When religious authorities appeal to the confines of the law, Jesus always points back to the purpose of the law, which is Leviticus 19:18: Love your neighbor. Jesus tries really hard to point people back to relationship with God and with neighbor, who for Jesus is the least of these. And for a while it works. After Jesus' ascension, his followers don't call themselves Christians, they call themselves The Way. It's Rome who calls them Christians, as a derogatory classification. It's also under

Rome, when Christianity is adopted by the empire, that Christianity, God and Jesus start to be named and defined—the very thing Jesus tried to avoid and the very thing our Jewish and Muslim siblings have been so good at staying away from. For when something can be defined or codified, it can be controlled.

Today, we worship Jesus' and God's identity. We cast them in stones and brush them into paintings. We've defined their essence in dogma and doctrine. And we often place them up on pedestals and affix our gaze. Meanwhile, the way of life they pointed us too, of loving neighbor, of caring for the outcast, the least of these, of doing justice, loving mercy, and walking humbly with God, are either neglected or relegated to the private and individual realms. We often treat Jesus' identity, as one who loves and saves us (individually), as good news. But this often doesn't result in good news for the poor, oppressed, marginalized, and beaten. This is why I preach so much on our actions as Christians and our response to God's love.

We have even defined and named our identities as Christians in this world to the same effect. We are Catholic, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Episcopalian, Methodist, Protestant, Evangelical, etc. And almost exclusively, our identities are about what we believe, not how we act.

My hope as a pastor is that we perpetually become more centered in this way of life Jesus calls us to and we let go of the identities that we've been grasping onto. When we look at the Bible, from beginning to end, we see this strong undercurrent of a God who calls us to love one another and to change the world through justice for the oppressed, far more than a God who calls us to assert our identities. When Jesus says we are to deny ourselves, pick up our cross, and follow him, I believe he is asking us to let go of the identities that hold us back from radically loving others, and radically start to love others. And I believe that if we do this, we will start to see a church that is more authentically aligned with Jesus' vision of "where two or three are gathered, a church that genuinely responds to the world's pain in systemic ways, and we will see more breakthroughs of God's kingdom come.

## **Noisy Offering is coming: Sept. 26 “Make Change for the Better”**

This offering helps Lutheran World Relief ship the kits to the people who need them. We send our kits to an “ingathering” day set up by LWR, so that there is no cost to us to ship them to the warehouse. ***(Assembly day is scheduled for Sept. 12<sup>th</sup> - see related articles)***



*Why do we need to ask for shipping cost donations instead of using those funds for creating more kits? Here's why: We plan to make 100+ School Kits and hoping for 100 Personal Care Kits. According to LWR, the approximate processing and shipping cost for each kit is as follows:*

LWR Mission Quilt: (per quilt \$2.25)

LWR School Kit: (\$1.40 per kit)

LWR Personal Care Kit: (\$2.65 per kit)\*

\*Your gifts to the LWR Quilt & Kit Shipping Fund, for Personal Care Kits, also helps LWR cover the cost of providing a tube of toothpaste for each kit.

Your quarters, dimes and nickels (and hopefully some dollars!) will help us ship both types of kits, which are desperately needed, according to LWR.

The August Noisy Offering total was used for purchasing items for our Day of Service projects, which are the school kits and the personal care kits.

We continue to “make change for the better” with the Noisy Sunday offerings. So bring your coins and make a noise on Sept. 26th. Together, we can CHANGE the world!

## Tuesday Food Distribution and Blessing Box Stories

Bethania's Emergency USDA Food Distribution site is every Tuesday from 5:15-6:45 pm. We purchase items for our clients as well as using food provided by FoodBank. In addition to this service, the Blessing Box is open 24/7 to serve the needs of those in our community. We stock it with donated items and through donated funds which help us provide everything from cereal to laundry soap to Vienna sausages and peanut butter and jelly.

Some of the stories we hear are heartbreaking. In August we had an elderly woman and her son come to the Tuesday Food Distribution for the first time. They had lost their home and were living in their van, with the son's children. He was very angry. The mother was worried about him. We gave them information about where to apply for rental assistance, gave them food and some unconditional love. She was crying when she said to me, "I thought no one around here would care about us."

On Tuesdays we see so much. Sometimes all goes smoothly, sometimes there are new challenges. This past Tuesday a man needed a special formula for his new baby that the pediatrician had told him he must get. He could not afford it or find it locally. He showed me a picture and was very emotional – I tried to let him know in my terrible Spanglish that we would get it for him the following week. This is just one of many, many babies we are trying to help have healthier lives. Some challenges local babies and families face: twins but not enough money for the formula, preemies needing extra care, cleft palate that will have at least 6 surgeries, baby born with hole in stomach, parents living with no clean water to make formula – these are all stories I have heard over the past several weeks. Yes, right here, in the Santa Ynez Valley.

At the Blessing Box last week, a woman and her two children came to check it out. The little boy was super excited – we had put some toilet paper in. "Mama, I get to have toilet paper!" he yelled. "And some cereal!" The mother told her children, "You need to thank God in your prayers for the people here who are helping all of us." It was something I have carried in my heart all week.

**We can always use donations of protein items (canned chicken, tuna, macaroni & cheese, peanut butter) and staples such as canned vegetables, pasta and sauce, jelly, honey, cereal, soup and chili.** Donations can be left in the church, at the church office or you can contact me to drop off items. **We also distribute diapers and wipes, along with incontinence and feminine hygiene items.** Donations of any of these products are greatly appreciated.

**If you would like to help, please contact me.** We appreciate and value every volunteer who assists us with this monumental task and cannot thank them enough. We need people to set up and pack some of the items in the morning at 10:30 and then another crew to help pack the bags and sort produce after 1:45. Unloading/moving helpers can come at 9:30 or 1:30. The evening distribution needs people who can lift heavy items and put things into cars, so if you are able to help, we would love to have you.

We continue to need your prayers and support for these projects, which are making a difference in so many lives here in our area.

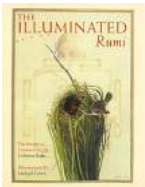

To be more informative and transparent, your Church Council is continuing the new process of communicating news and publishing decisions we have made via the Beacon. Our goal, each month, is to announce major decisions taken by the council to help everyone stay abreast of issues facing the church. Questions, if any, about these discussions, decisions, or messages should be addressed to a council member preferably in writing.

From the August Council meeting, we would like to report on the following topics:

- Sunday School will begin Sept. 5<sup>th</sup> at the 11 AM hour. We are still looking for a couple of teachers. If you can volunteer, please contact Livier or Kristyl.
- Approved the hiring of Cynthia Nunez-Perez as lead teacher in the after school care program for the Preschool.
- Approved up to \$1,000 for purchasing plants and benches to complete the pergola area as a prayer garden.
- Approved request for continued Endowment funding (\$5,000 per month) on an as needed basis depending on cash flow needs.
- Agreed to seek estimates for concreting in the area closest to the parish hall that is now dead grass and weeds, and add a fire pit for a conversation area.
- Funding for both of the above projects will come from designated funds.
- The Fireside Room is being set up for youth space in addition to being used by the preschool.
- Vacation Bible School was a great success with nearly 50 kids in attendance.
