Pastor Chris's Message

You may not know this about me, but I tend to be kind of a negative person. When it comes to scenarios or expectations of people I don't know well, I tend to think outcomes will be negative more often than positive. I think it's a defense mechanism in preparing myself not to be disappointed when things don't turn out well. For some reason, this doesn't impact my relationships with people I know—I'm pretty good at seeing the "beloved child of God" in people at a personal level. But overall, I'd say I'm a "glass is slightly half-empty" kind of a person. And..... I don't think I'm alone in this. In fact, I think this is how most people are, and I think perhaps it's because of the same defense mechanism of not wanting to be disappointed.

The Christianity I grew up with fits into this mold as well. I was raised to look at the world through the eyes of "good vs. evil", those who believe as worthy and righteous and those who don't believe as unworthy and corrupt, and an outlook of the world moving perpetually in a negative direction until God shows up and finally fixes everything for the last time.

And then there's Easter. I'm finding that Easter is God's hopeful and positive outlook of the world. Jesus enters into this time and place where the Jewish people are living under pretty bad conditions due to Rome. People are being taxed beyond their ability, and anyone who steps out of line is dealt with swiftly. Jesus is among his own people who are living in a dark, negative, world hoping for someone to pull them out of it. And we see in the Bible the way they think God will pull them out of this despair is by fighting violence with violence; by being even bigger and more dominating than Rome. Jesus enters Jerusalem with his followers assuming this moment to be at hand. And then he's captured. And then he's nailed to the cross. I imagine the negative perception of his followers hit a peak in this moment. The world couldn't possibly be any darker. And then there's Easter.

It's as though God, who operates with a cosmic time rather than our temporal time, was letting God's people know that we don't have to enter into the cycle of negativity. We don't have to play the game of tit-for-tat in order to get the outcomes where we end up on top. I think Easter shows us that through this compassionate and loving way of life, we can enter into the negativity of the world and things will be okay. We can create positive change and break cycles of anger, resentment, revenge, and despair, but it takes intentionality, patience, and a commitment to this loving, positive, way of life.

Paul says in his letter to the Corinthians, "If Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain, and your faith has been in vain." In other words, Easter is this cosmic confirmation that this way of life we are called to ultimately plays out. Jesus willingly walks into a violent and angry world, never raising a hand, but remains committed to this positive, loving way of life, and over and over again, calls his followers to imitate him. It may feel like a risk to do this in the world today, but if we believe Easter is real, then Easter is the exclamation point on where this way of life leads us and the world—it's not to anger, vitriol, and death, but to love, community, and life. Sometimes, I really need to remind myself of the power of this story.

"Let us love not in word or speech but in deed and truth." —1 John 3:18


