10,000 Ways Not to Do Something

How do you think we deal with faults? I posed this question to the Unorthodox group a couple weeks ago, and at first the responses were pretty positive. Most people were raised by their parents not to be shamed when they made mistakes and were given the freedom to feel like trying again. However, the response was dramatically different when it switched to peers. How did peers in school, friends in life, and colleagues at work respond when someone would make a mistake? Most people said that it was not only shaming, but done in a way where folks felt like they had to carry their mistakes on their sleeves for a long time.

Imagine the lasting effects of this. If you felt like your mistakes would be thrown into your face by your peers, what would you do when you made a mistake? Would you be open about it? Or would you try to bury it? Would you come clean if someone brought it up? Or would you work overtime to deny it ever happened? Would you be quick to genuinely apologize? Or would you make excuses, deflect, etc.?

Jesus was a person who inherently believed in and extended to others New Beginnings. Consider the apostles he calls: One of them is a tax collector, a local Jewish person employed by the Roman Empire to collect taxes from their community members. They were reputed to not just collect what was required (which was already a lot), but they also collected extra for their own pocket, thus enriching themselves. And everyone knew about this. And yet Jesus calls a tax-collector to join a bunch of average Joes, all of whom probably had to pay their taxes to this person. Imagine the anger. Imagine what they wanted to do. Imagine what they felt was justifiable retribution for extortion. And yet, the gospels give no indication of this. Jesus never condemns him for past sins, berates him in front of others, or seeks reparations before he can become a follower. He is just welcomed. He no longer participates in his get-rich scheme and becomes fully dedicated to a way of life of love and compassion and taking care of many people to whom he probably did harm. But he does so without any guilt forced on him by others. He is simply offered the chance to begin anew.

If you were to ask anyone, or even yourself, if you are perfect, or if you are a person who makes mistakes, what would they say? Correct. We are people built to evolve. And we don't evolve by one increasing success after another, but by bumping into walls, by stubbing toes, by hurting others and feeling really bad about it and choosing not to do that again. We are built to make mistakes and learn from those mistakes and grow from them. And Jesus knew this intimately and responded in kind. It

was more important for his followers to feel the freedom to try again, rather than shamed to fear trying at all. Yet, we live in a paradoxical society where we both acknowledge that we're imperfect and yet have a standard of perfection for most people around us.

Thomas Edison once said, "I don't make mistakes, I just find 10,000 ways not to do something." Our path as a church is not to point out flecks in our neighbors eye, but rather give them loving space to make mistakes and grow from them, to have the freedom to try again because continuing to try loving people as best we can is what our faith is all about. By the way, the Bible has a word for this kind of work. It's called Grace.

Food Distribution at Bethania

Last night was our last Tuesday distribution in January. We have seen an increase, week by week after the holidays, with more people coming to Bethania for food each week. But last night was different.

The last week is usually a USDA week, the one week out of the month that the majority of what we give out comes from government programs through the Food Bank. Last night we were wondering — will the spending freeze on all government programs change this? Will we need to be spending even more of our funds to keep feeding people? (Since last night, the spending freeze was rescinded for now — stay tuned.)

Usually, our food line starts forming at 2:30. People arrive and wait for us to open. Cars start lining up to wrap around the block. There is a lot of socializing going on while clients wait for us to open. Not last night. ICE was in town.

At 3:30 we only had one person waiting in the walk up line. No cars were in the lot besides those of Preschool families. Close to 5:00, when we were starting to move pallets to set up, only 7 cars were in the drive up line and about 12 people waiting in the walk up. This was eerie and completely unheard of at the Food Distribution. As the evening progressed, people started arriving – and asking to pick up for lots of other families. Pastor Chris was on hand in case ICE showed up to guide us through proper legal procedures. Yes, people were afraid they would be picked up on church property if they came for food to feed their families.

One family who has been coming for years and has also helped at our Food Dist. was too scared to leave their apartment – so we made a delivery for her and also her sister's family. Young people in line were saying, "My mom sent me to get the food." As it got darker and later, more people came. We ended up serving exactly 200 households, but it was a completely different feeling last night. Most noticeably, we had no field workers that we could spot. Did they send someone else to get their food? Were they picked up? Hiding? Someone told us people have been moving out in the middle of the night in the area.

ICE agents in town have terrified local workers and affected businesses - just in the past few days. Not all of the people who are scared are illegal – many are just afraid of "what could happen" if they are picked up, questioned or arrested. Many of our clients told me last night how stressful and frightened they are, regardless of their legal status. Restaurant and hotel workers, field workers, gardeners, cleaners, and especially caregivers – the ripple effect will hit our economy hard. Many of these people do jobs that no one I know would like to do. Would you like to get up at 4 am and go pick fields until 3 pm in the afternoon? I sure would not want to.

Whatever your politics, the new mandate from the President with Immigration and Customs Enforcement policy is having an impact on our local economy. It is also having an impact on people who really need help, who are living at the low to moderate income level. Recently the Public Policy Institute revealed that Santa Barbara County has the second highest poverty rate among all 58 counties in the state of California. After running this food distribution for almost 5 years now, I believe it.

Please pray for all who are affected by the ICE enforcement in so many ways. We continue to need your prayers and support for this mission, which is making a difference in so many lives here in our area.

Fastelavn 2025



We also **concluded** a discussion about the pros and cons of making our church a California Historical Building. We agreed not to pursue it because it would prohibit us from making certain kinds of repairs and updates.

We **celebrated** the fact that December giving reduced the 2024 deficit from \$20,000 to only \$2,000. Thanks be to God!

Finally, we **noted** some important upcoming dates in the life of the church: Feb. 23, the Congregational Meeting; March 1, Fastelavn; March 22, Pastor Chris's 10 Anniversary Dinner. But there are more. We are a "church that does"!
